VERDICT TRENDS

While some believe that the effort to reform the tort system which has been ongoing over the past decade and a half has had an impact on the exposure, the facts do not seem to support that conclusion. It is true that the number of cases actually going to verdict are down slightly but the size of verdicts have increased in just about all lines of personal injury litigation, and particularly in the field of products liability from 1993 through 1999, according to a study recently released by Jury Verdict Research entitled "2000 Current Award Trends".

The study reveals that the mean verdict from 1993 to 1999 increased from \$324,037 to \$457,422 in premises liability; \$758,539 to \$1,727,220 in business negligence; \$1,953,383 to \$3,495,354 in medical malpractice; \$248,833 to \$2,959,047 in personal negligence; and up to \$7,350,888 in products liability. And what is more alarming is that the rate of increase accelerated dramatically from 1998 to 1999. For example personal negligence rose from \$628,148 in 1998 to \$2,959,047 in 1999 and products liability went from \$3,154,043 to \$7,350,888 over that same time period. Overall, jury verdicts just about doubled from 1993 to 1999 with around 60% of that increase taking place in just the last year of the study period.

Of course, these are means so that they can be skewed by a small number of high verdicts. The point to be made, however, is that these large verdicts are occurring in alarmingly increasing numbers. Moreover, the *median* award, not including punitive damages, has more than tripled over the period of the study, from \$500,300 in 1993 to \$1.8 million in 1999. Again, the biggest part of the increase has taken place over the last three years, and awards now are growing at the fastest rate in two decades.

The trends in settlements was similar. This is important since only a small percentage of cases reach the trial stage and an even smaller percentage actually proceed through the trial to a jury verdict.

Another significant fact is that 4% of the cases included a punitive damage award in 1999 compared to 3% in 1998, with a median punitive award of \$200,000.

CHANGE IN NATIONAL RIMS BYLAWS

During the recent RIMS National Conference in Atlanta the House of Delegates passed an amendment to the RIMS Constitution and Bylaws which could have a significant financial impact on attending future National Conferences. As most of you are aware membership in RIMS allows only two deputy memberships for each member.

Very often larger companies such as Disney and Mattel would send somebody else from their department that was not classified as a deputy member. Commencing in April 2002 such attendees will have to pay the non-member registration fee which is \$300 higher than the registration fee for deputy members. One solution to reduce this cost would be to pay for additional deputy members at renewal time at a cost of \$125 per additional deputy members.

The Los Angeles chapter Board of Directors is not happy with this change in the bylaws and voted against it at the House of Delegates meeting. Unfortunately while the vote was close the motion to change the bylaws carried. Compared to other conferences the RIMS National Conference is still a bargain and very worthwhile attending so we urge you to budget for the conference in New Orleans next April and if you intend to send a member of your department who is not a deputy add them to your list of deputies when you renew in 2002.
